


HERB SILVERMAN: CANDIDATE WITHOUT A PRAYER SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 19, 2012, 4 PM, GAGE HALL, 4 ARCHDALE ST.

ur speaker for February is SHL's founder and vice president, Herb Silverman.

Herb is also founder and president of the Secular Coalition for America and Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Mathematics at the College of Charleston. He ran for governor of SouthCarolina in the 1990s to challenge a state law that required religious belief to hold public office. After an eight-year battle, Herb won a unanimous decision in the South Carolina Supreme Court, which struck down this religious test requirement.

In his recently released autobiography, Candidate without a Prayer, Herb tells his iconoclastic life story. Equal parts Bertrand Russell, Woody Allen, and Elizabeth Cady Stanton, he takes the reader from his childhood as an Orthodox Jew in Philadelphia, where he stopped fasting on Yom Kippur to test God's existence, to his adult life in the heart of the Bible Belt, where he became a legendary figure within America's secular activist community and

remains one of its most beloved leaders.

Never one to shy from controversy, Silverman relates many of his experiences facing Christian fundamentalists of all stripes in open debate. He is equally candid about the battles he has faced in the secular community itself and the many hurdles he overcame in the historic step of politically uniting the country's major secular, humanist, and atheist groups under the banner of the Secular Coalition for America.



BOOK GROUP SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 26, 2012, 4 PM WEST ASHLEY BARNES & NOBLE 1812 SAM RITTENBERG, CHARLESTON

The Book Group will meet on February 26, 2012, to discuss The 10,000 Year Explosion: How Civilization Accelerated Human Evolution, by Gregory Cochran and Henry Harpending.

Resistance to malaria. Blue eyes. Lactose tolerance. What do all of these traits have in common? Every one of them has emerged in the last 10,000 years.



Scientists have long believed that the "great leap forward" that occurred some 40,000 to 50,000 years ago in Europe marked end of significant biological evolution in humans. In this stunningly original account of our evolutionary history, top scholars Gregory Cochran and Henry Harpending reject this conventional wisdom and reveal that the human species has undergone a storm of genetic change much more recently. Human evolution in fact accelerated after civilization arose, they contend, and these ongoing changes have played a pivotal role in human history. They argue that biology explains the expansion of the Indo-Europeans, the European conquest of the Americas, and European Jews' rise to intellectual prominence.

Ranging across subjects as diverse as human domestication, Neanderthal hybridization, and IQ tests, Cochran and Harpending's analysis demonstrates convincingly that human genetics have changed and can continue to change much more rapidly than scientists have previously believed.

Barnes & Noble sells the book online for \$15.39, with used copies available for less than \$10. There are three copies of the book in the Charleston Public Library system.

As always, we'll meet at the West Ashley Barnes & Noble, located at 1812 Sam Rittenberg Boulevard. The discussion (which promises to be a particularly lively one this time) runs from 4:00 pm till 5:30 pm, and we usually go out to dinner afterward.

THE DEATH OF GOD

In October 1965 Time magazine stirred up a tempest among the general public with a cover story called "Christian Atheism: The 'God Is Dead' Movement." The

story focused on recent developments in Christian theology in which academics discussed the need for society to recognize that it behaved as if God were no longer active in the world. They claimed that modern man functions without the need for some transcendent explanation of life, and theologians had difficulty in finding words to describe God. The argument went as follows: what could theology say about religion when God, as Friedrich Nietzsche said, is dead? The God of the Christian past no longer served a function.

The movement got its name from the title of Gabriel Vahanian's book The Death of God: The Culture of Our Post-Christian Era (1961), but the controversy was stirred by the work of Thomas J. J. Altizer, The Gospel of Christian Atheism (1966). The movement attempted to create a theology which recognized the futility of using the traditional definitions of God, yet it accepted that the historical Jesus spoke to man in his current context, a context of a culture where mankind created a life defined in the secular. One had to discern the profane form of Jesus's presence in the world and live with the world's contradictions. As Altizer remarked, "Once we confess that Christ is fully present in the moment before us, then we can truly love the world and embrace

even its pain and darkness as an epiphany of the body of Christ."

"Atlanta, Ga., Nov 9—God, creator of the universe, principal deity of the world's Jews, ultimate reality of Christians, and most eminent of all divinities, died late

yesterday during major surgery undertaken to correct a massive diminishing influence.

Reaction from the world's great and from the man in

the street was uniformly incredulous.... From Independence, Mo., former President Harry S. Truman, who received the news in his Kansas City barbershop, said I'm always sorry to hear somebody is dead. It's a damn shame." Source: *motive*, Methodist student magazine, as quoted in *Time*, 87 (8 April 1966): 68.

The public debate was brief. While general-circulation magazines and newsmagazines joined religious publications to carry twenty-six articles about the issue in 1966 and 1967, by the following year religious publications and journals of opinion carried only seven articles about the movement, and the issue moved back into the academic world.

The controversy reflected a growing split between the mainline Protestant churches, which were more open to new theological trends and focused on social issues, and conservatives in those denominations (sometimes even whole denominations), who insisted on the faith of their fathers, a faith that focused on a triune God, the inerrancy of the Bible, the need for personal salvation, and tradition. Conservatives added new theological offensives to their lists of objections to mainline leaders. One response to the controversy was a bumper sticker, an increasingly popular means of expression dur-

ing the decade, reading "My God is not dead. I talked with Him this morning."


