avid Silverman is President of the American Atheists, a non-profit organization founded in 1963. Now in its fourth decade, American Atheists is dedicated to working for the civil rights of atheists, promoting sepa-

ration of state and church, and providing information about atheism.

Mr. Silverman attended Brandeis University, where he completed his Bachelor's Degree in Computer Science while honing his debating skills with theists in numerous informal debates. Dave served as a professional inventor at Bell labs for eight years (74 issued patents) and a Marketing Director for Natural microsystems.

Dave has been an atheist since he was six years old. He became an activist in 1996 and soon became

New Jersey State Director. He also founded the Alliance of Lucent and AT&T Atheists and Secularists, the first employee club of its kind. He was tapped to be the National Spokesperson in 2004, and then was named Vice President in 2008. The Board of Directors elected Dave

as President in September of 2010.

Mr. Silverman has appeared on most major news programs including The O'Reilly Factor (spawning the famous "WTF meme-face"), Scarborough Country, The

> Situation Room with Wolf Blitzer, CNN's Paula Zahn NOW, Nick News, Hannity and Colmes, FOX and Friends, NPR's All Things Considered, and many more. Dave hosts the Atheist Viewpoint TV show with co-host Dennis Horvitz.

Sunday Quest, our new humanist youth program, will provide our children an opportunity to learn about humanism and all of its life-affirming ideals. Modeled after the Harvard Humanist Learning Lab and other secular Sunday schools, our goal with Sunday Quest is to create a safe space for children to explore their developing worldviews, think for themselves, connect with their community, and build a strong ethical foundation.

Sunday Quest will be geared toward children ages 5-12 years old. We request that parents drop their children off and attend the adult SHL meeting during the children's program. If space allows, children older than 12 years old may attend as program assistants and children younger than 5 years old may attend with a parent. The program will last approximately an hour to an hour and a half.

During this month's program, children will explore social rules and how we use them to interact with each other to make our community a better place. Kids will compare rules from religious traditions as well as come up with what they think are ideal rules for society. Additionally, we will give the kids an opportunity to put their ethics in action by introducing a community service opportunity. November 16-24 is National Hunger and Homelessness Awareness Week, so we will use that as a starting point to collect items for care packages for the homeless. We will collect items throughout the year and distribute at a later date.



### BOOK GROUP SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 24, 2013, 4 PM WEST ASHLEY BARNES & NOBLE 1812 SAM RITTENBERG, CHARLESTON

Victor Stenger's God and the Folly of Faith is a thorough and hard-hitting critique that is a must read for anyone interested in the interaction between religion and science.

It has become the prevalent view among sociologists, historians, and some theistic scientists that religion and science have never been in serious conflict. Some even claim that Christianity was responsible for



the development of science. In a sweeping historical survey that begins with ancient Greek science and proceeds through the Renaissance and Enlightenment to contemporary advances in physics and cosmology, Stenger makes a convincing case that not only is this conclusion false, but Christianity actually held back the progress of science for one thousand years. It is significant, he notes, that the scientific revolution of the seventeenth century occurred only after the revolts against established ecclesiastic authorities in the Renaissance and Reformation opened up new avenues of thought.

On Sunday, November 24, SHL's book group will meet to discuss God and the Folly of Faith: The Incompatibility of Science and Religion.

As always, We'll meet at the West Ashley Barnes & Noble, located at 1812 Sam Rittenberg Blvd. Our discussion runs from 4 pm to 5:30 pm and we usually go out to dinner afterwards.

When faith rules over facts, magical thinking becomes deeply ingrained and warps all areas of life. It produces a frame of mind in which concepts are formulated with deep passion but without the slightest attention paid to the evidence.

# CHARITY OF THE QUARTER CHARLESTON ANIMAL SOCIETY

The Charleston Animal Society is our charity of the quarter for November and December. For 139 years, the mission of CAS has been the same—preventing cruelty to animals.

Every day, CAS combats cruelty by using innovative, science-based strategies including a large-scale spay/neuter program, a free roaming cat initiative, educational outreach programs that teach children to be humanitarians and a food bank for pets that helped 900 families last year. CAS also works with police, prosecutors and lawmakers to make sure animal cruelty laws are enforced and made stronger.

Recently, CAS launched No Kill Charleston 2015—the boldest animal welfare initiative ever undertaken in the Southeast. By thinking out of the box, using proven best practices from animal organizations across the nation, and implementing research-based strategies, CAS has moved from what is known as an Annual Live Release Rate of 34% in 2007 to over a 75% Annual Live Release Rate today, which is almost unheard of in the animal welfare world. Comparatively, other parts of the state realize low live release rates ranging from 10% to 30%.

# IS ATHEISM WINNING THE CULTURE WAR? HERB SILVERMAN

Barking dogs chase passing cars that they never come close to touching, and I doubt they consider the ramifications of actually catching a vehicle. Cars, of course, ignore the dogs. Many atheists have long been barking at how our mainstream culture seems wrapped in religion, and most religious people have simply ignored the atheists. However, it appears that atheists are getting closer to "catching" the mainstream culture, and should consider strategies and ramifications.

Here I use the word "atheist" in a big-tent sort of way to include agnostics, humanists, secular humanists, free-thinkers, nontheists, anti-theists, skeptics, rationalists, naturalists, materialists, ignostics, apatheists, and more. If you don't know what each of these words means, don't

worry. Even those who identify with such labels often disagree on their definitions. Parsing words might be a characteristic of folks engaged in the secular movement. My inclusive term "functional atheist" embodies those who live as if there are no personal, judging gods.

The Secular Coalition for America (of which I'm founder and president emeritus) includes 11 national, nontheistic member organizations. The members cooperate on the 95 percent they have

in common instead of arguing about labels. We all agree there should be a wall between religion and government; that we should increase the visibility of, and respect for, nontheistic viewpoints; that we should encourage and help pave the way for atheists to come out of the closet; and that atheists deserve a place at the table of public opinion. How best to achieve our goals is not so clear.

Atheists have long been known primarily for criticizing religion and protesting the intrusion of religion into government. Such actions are often called for, especially when conservative religionists set a political agenda that affects those who don't share their religious beliefs. We must confront and respond, and let the undecided judge who is more honest, reasonable, tolerant, and fair.

Nontheistic groups have formed welcoming commu-

nities, with a variety of activities for individuals and families. Some groups are primarily interested in lectures and book clubs, some in socializing, some in good works, some in protesting, some in political action, and some in all of the above. There are also many virtual atheist groups, who enjoy discussions even though they never meet.

For many years, I've been encouraging atheists and humanists to organize and cooperate in order to change the culture. However, the movement has become larger than formal organizations alone, perhaps because of the increasing number of "nones," those who don't identify with any religion. According to a recent Pew Survey, this demographic has risen to 20 percent, and even higher

among millenials.

They will probably not be joining atheist or humanist organizations in large numbers, and I'm fine with that. Even though I'm very interested in religion, part of me wishes I didn't have to be. I've gone from religious believer to apathetic atheist and finally to activist atheist because of my concern that the religious right wants to move our country closer to theocratic rule.

Unlike the religious right, "nones" are generally accepting of full and equal rights for atheists, gays, women, and other marginalized groups. If young people continue to be more interested in how we treat others and what we do to make the world a better place, rather than equating morality with religion, then we will finally realize an America that values freedom of and freedom from religion.

Since we are evolving into a country where deeds are more important than creeds, I think atheists will one day be part of a respected mainstream in America, along with progressive religious allies. If that happens, I will be glad to see the Secular Coalition and its nontheistic partners go out of business and call it "mission accomplished."

# UPSTATE ATHEISTS BOUNCE BACK AFTER BEING BANNED HEMANT MEHTA THE FRIENDLY ATHEIST

Earlier this year, the Upstate Atheists from Spartanburg, South Carolina attempted to volunteer at the Spartanburg Soup Kitchen. Unfortunately, its director Lou Landrum denied their offer, saying atheists weren't welcome there. Landrum took things even further last week when she told the *Spartanburg Herald-Journal* that allowing atheists to help in her kitchen would be a "disservice to this community."

... Landrum, executive director of the Soup Kitchen, told the *Herald-Journal* she would resign from her job before she let atheists volunteer and be a "disservice to this community."

"This is a ministry to serve God" she said. "We stand on the principles of God. Do they (atheists) think that our guests are so ignorant that they don't know what an atheist is? Why are they targeting us? They don't give any money. I wouldn't want their money."

Despite the setback, the atheists pulled through for the people they were trying to help. On Saturday [October 26], they gave

away over 300 care packages to the homeless, each package costing about \$15 and including things like gloves, toothpaste, hand sanitizer, lip balm, snacks, etc.

Landrum had said "They can have the devil there with them, but they better not come across the street." I don't see the devil in any of those pictures. Just kind, wonderful, godless people trying to help the people around them.

I also don't see a "No Christians Allowed" sign.

And this is just the beginning.

Susan Bryker, the group's Social Media Director, tells me they'll be volunteering on November 16 at the Greer Soup Kitchen. Considering the GSK is "a part of Daily Bread Ministries," I think it's a safe assumption that this is also a Christian group, one that doesn't have a problem with non-religious help. (What say you to that, Landrum?) Sue added in an email, "[the Greer Soup Kitchen] even wrote to us during the recent media frenzy to tell us how much they look forward to us coming."

They'll also be returning to where they were today, across the street from the Spartanburg Soup Kitchen, to do another giveaway. Next time, they'll be handing out

coats, gloves, blankets, tarps, and more.

And in December, they plan to provide gifts, including clothes and requested toys, to children in the Spartanburg foster care system.
