Tom Flynn: The Trouble with Christmas Sunday, November 16, 2014, 4 PM, Gage Hall, 4 Archdale St, Charleston

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About SHL

The Secular Humanists of the Lowcountry was founded in 1994 by a group of local non-theists in Charleston, South Carolina.

Our members are freethinkers of many kinds. We call ourselves agnostics, atheists, skeptics, secular humanists, rationalists and scientific naturalists. We welcome you and all who are interested in participating in our friendly community, either as members or observers.

The purpose of our non-profit, educational organization is to promote the non-theistic, humancentered viewpoint as a valid contribution to public discourse and to strive to maintain the First Amendment guarantee of separation of state and church. Tom Flynn has been recounting the history of the year-end holidays – and offering his rollicking rationale for why secular hu-

manists should just sit the merriment out – since his book *The Trouble with Christmas* came out in 1993. His

presentation is now fully illustrated in a lavish PowerPoint presentation containing more than 200 slides. (Fear not, as the angel never really said; some of those slides go by really, really fast.)

In The Trouble with Christmas Flynn will examine where our most treasured holiday traditions came from - from the Christ Child to Santa Claus, from the wassail bowl to the tannenbaum - and ask whether there's still time to send them back. It's an information-filled, thoughtprovoking, yet wildly funny audio-visual extravaganza. Missing this presentation would be like getting a lump of coal in your stocking!

Flynn is Executive Director of the Council for Secular Humanism, Editor of Free Inquiry magazine, and Director of the Robert Green



Ingersoll Birthplace Museum. He co-founded and was for 13 years co-editor of the newsletter Secular Humanist

Bulletin. In 1984, having recently given up his religious beliefs for atheism, Flynn stopped celebrating Christmas because "it was no longer the birthday of anyone I knew." Flynn urges fellow unbe-lievers to make themselves more visible by sitting out the winter holidays. He argues that Christmas is too narrowly Anglophile to continue much longer as the compulsory winter holiday of an increasingly diverse America. And he maintains: "Yes, Virginia, believing in the Santa Claus myth is harmful to young people's mental development."

After writing The Trouble with Christmas in 1993, Flynn made hundreds of radio and TV appearances in his role as the curmudgeonly "anti-Claus." A leading authority on the Santa myth, he appeared in A&E Network's Biography segment on Santa, which has aired hundreds of times. His other books include the science-fiction satire novels Galactic Rapture and Nothing Sacred, and the reference work The New Encyclopedia of Unbelief, which he edited. Most recently he served as executive producer and an on-screen presenter in the Council for Secular Humanism's fourpart video miniseries American Freethought.






We will go out to eat as usual after the meeting. Early arrivals have the privilege of choosing where we go out to eat.

Happy Halloween to All Who Aren't Afraid of Harmless Fun

The War on Christmas rages on. The War on Thanksgiving has begun.

But what about Halloween?

A while back I wrote about the <u>War On Christmas</u> manufactured by Fox News, in which saying "Happy Holidays" instead of "Merry Christmas" was somehow taken as an insult to Christians. Then I wrote about the <u>War on</u> <u>Thanksgiving</u>, again manufactured by Fox News after President Obama gave a three-minute Thanksgiving Day speech without the word "God" in it. So now I'll complete the <u>hat trick</u> by writing about the War on Halloween.

Christian evangelist Pat Robertson is the most famous opponent of Halloween, which he calls "Satan's night." Robertson claimed, without any evidence, that the original practice of trickor-treating came from the Druids, who went house to house asking for money and threatening to kill one of the owner's sheep if he didn't pony up. (Both October 31 and December 25 were initially celebrated by pagans and later adapted by Christians.)

Pat Robertson doesn't like children dressing up as ghosts or zombies, which he doesn't believe exist. However, he does believe in the Holy Ghost. And since a zombie is supposed to be a human who died, was raised from the dead, and once more walked among the living, the Gospels seem to imply that Jesus was a zombie. Furthermore, Zombie Jesus offers everyone the ultimate trick or treat: eternal torture or eternal bliss. To Pat Robertson's credit (I've never used *that* phrase before),

he is merely spreading misinformation and advising Christians not to celebrate Halloween. This is a moderate position compared to some other groups.


The ministry of Christians against Halloween considers Halloween "the anti-Christ's biggest nightly congregation of hell and damnation on earth." And it's just as bad to go to horror movies at Halloween or any other time because they are "created by disturbed and evil people, by the inspiration of the devil, for the purpose of manifesting demonic wickedness and evil in a tangible, visible and audible way." Hey, I've learned from horror movies that you can protect yourself from demons by simply waving a cross or wearing a necklace of garlic cloves. This ministry would

like Christians to "barricade their family in their home, with the doors locked and the shades closed, praying for Jesus Christ to protect them and stand guard around their home to keep them safe from all the wickedness (people and demons) that are crawling the neighborhoods." This sounds a lot like a real-life horror scenario to me, not to mention child abuse.

And speaking of child abuse, some churches use "<u>Hell House</u>" evangelism on Halloween and other times to shock young people with graphic exhibits and frighten them into becoming Christians. They literally try to scare the hell out of children by promoting misinformation about the "gay lifestyle," premarital sex, satanic rituals, and demonic possession.

All this reminds me of Carl Sagan's insightful book, <u>The Demon</u> <u>Haunted World</u>, and H.L. Mencken's comment that "Puritanism is the <u>haunting fear</u> that someone, somewhere may be happy."

I began celebrating Halloween early this year on October 25 with a <u>5K Zombie Run</u> in my local county park. Some of us were runners and others were dressed as zombies who stalked the runners and tried to grab "flags" worn on the runners' belts. I'm happy to report that we all had fun and survived this race for the "undead."



The Tuesday after Halloween this year is another scary time for many — Election Day. A candidate in my home state of South Carolina seems to have conflated the two days. Anthony Culler, Republican nominee for Congress in the 6th District, refers to same sex couples as "<u>Gremlins who will destroy our way of life</u>." Now that's really scary, even for South Carolina Republicans.

Because of my tradition, I suppose I shouldn't be surprised by so many holiday wars. A half-joking description of all Jewish holidays is: "They tried to kill us. We survived. Let's eat!" This means latkes, gefilte fish, chicken soup, kugel, and hamentashen — not people.

Happy Halloween to all whose worldview doesn't preclude a little harmless fun.
