

SHL Book Club



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Charity of the Quarter

SHL collects donations for a local charity each quarter, and donates the full amount under the name Secular Humanists of the Lowcountry. Our first Charity of the Quarter for 2015 is Meals on Wheels of Charleston.

Meals on Wheels of Charleston provides free, hot, nutritious meals and daily monitoring for seniors in need. This program serves low-income seniors who are homebound or have moderate to severe physical restrictions.

Through a network of staff and volunteers, MOW packages and delivers hot noon meals to house -bound seniors. While there, the meal deliverers check to see if the clients are stable, comforta-

ble, and safe. Many of the clients live in substandard housing, have serious health conditions with little to no family support. Clients are referred by medical staff, family, friends, hospice, and other human services organizations.



MOW Charleston serves seniors in Downtown and the Charleston Peninsula, North Charleston, West Ashley, Ravenel/Hollywood, and James/Johns/Wadmalaw & Edisto Islands.

7 Conversations to Have With the Atheist in Your Family

Recently I gave suggestions on what religious people should not say to the atheist in the family. Here are conversations and suggestions that might improve family relations, especially at holiday gatherings.

1. Listen to the atheist.

You might have preconceived ideas on why a family member "turned his back on God." You are probably wrong. Try to understand and respect his point of view, even if you disagree. That's a prerequisite for most conversations, especially ones that can become touchy or emotional. Listening to the atheist will be an added incentive for the atheist to listen to you.

2. Look for common ground.

You and your atheist family member might differ on God beliefs, but you likely have a lot more in common than what sets you apart. You probably appreciate the same foods at family dinners. And since watching holiday football games has become somewhat of a national religion, you might all be cheering for the same team. Talk about those

common interests and why you are grateful that you can still get along so well. If you also think behavior is more important than belief, say so.

3. Explain how your religious beliefs have changed since childhood.

Your atheist family member might assume that her religious views have matured, but yours have not. If appropriate, tell her that you accept the evidence for evolution (even if you believe God was behind it) and you no longer believe that Noah gathered pairs of all animals including polar bears in a Mideast ark and watched as the rest of humanity drowned. However, if you have

the same religious beliefs you had when you were five years old, you might wish to skip this suggestion.

4. Invite the atheist to ask you questions.

Undoubtedly, he has frequently been asked why he became an atheist. He will appreciate the opportunity to ask you why you believe as you do. Both of you might come out with a better understanding of each other.

5. Ask for her favorite quotes about religion.

Most atheists are familiar with biblical quotes directed their way, either to convince them to believe or to put the "fear of God" in them. Your atheist might quote Thomas Jefferson: "It does me no injury for my neighbor to say there are 20 gods or no God. It neither picks my pocket nor breaks my leg." Or Robert Ingersoll: "The hands that help are better far than lips that pray." Or Abraham Lincoln: "When I do good, I feel good. When I do bad, I feel bad. That's my religion." self and offer to discuss them with her. She'll love you for it.

6. Mention that being a minority within the family is not so bad.

Describe how you, too, are a minority in the family, or ways in which everybody in the family is a minority within the larger com-

7. Discuss the reason for the season.

The family has gathered for a reason. It might be a holiday, an anniversary, or some other special event. No matter, you can

end with some aphorism that all nice people, religious or not, can appreciate. The reason for every season can be a hope for "peace on earth and goodwill toward men and women." Better yet, even a discussion about a family plan to bring everyone closer to attaining what might be that dream.

Finally, there are smaller costs such as the rental fee for Gage Hall, credit card processing fees, meeting refreshments, PO Box rental, member perks such as stipends for attendance at Humanist/Atheist/Freethought events, and more.

We are proud of the fact that we do not require membership to attend our activities. Instead, we hope that you see the great value in your annual donation to maintain a robust and active secular humanist organization in the Charleston area.

Membership is open to all who support the purposes for which this organization is founded. The available membership levels and corresponding dues (new members and renewals) are:

- Family \$50.00
- Sustaining \$100.00

Dues are tax-deductible, as we are a 501(c)3 non-profit corporation. (As we like to joke, we are also a "non-prophet" organization!)

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Member Perk: Stipends

SHL offers five stipends annually to dues-paying members to help offset costs associated with attending an atheist/freethought conference or convention, or to attend a free-



thought summer camp. Some examples of eligible events are the American Atheists convention, Freedom From Religion Foundation con-

vention, American Humanists convention, Camp Quest, and Camp Inquiry, among others.

Stipends are available to duespaying members. A member may not receive a stipend two consecutive years, however different members of a family membership are eligible even if another family member received a stipend the previous year.

Stipends cover up to \$200 of registration, travel, and lodging costs. Food and drink expenses are not eligible for stipends.

A stipend request must be preapproved before attending your event. To see whether your event qualifies or to inquire about stipend availability and to apply, or if you have questions about the stipend program, contact treasure@lowcountryhumanists.org.

Stipend recipients must write a short essay about their event experience and submit it along with their receipts to treasur-

er@lowcountryhumanists.org within 30 days of the completion of the event. The essay will be published in an issue of *The Separationist*. Parents may assist young children who attended camp with their essays but the essay should reflect the child's own words as much as possible.
