Alex Kasman (Vice President): Alex Kas-


man is a math professor at the College of Charleston.



In June we are reading <u>Islam and the Future of Toler-</u> <u>ance: A Dialogue by Sam Harris</u> (10/6/2015). This is a transcribed dialogue between Harris, a famous atheist, and Maajid Nawaz, a former radical.



In this short book, Sam Harris and Maajid Nawaz invite you to join an urgently needed conversation: Is Islam a religion of peace or war? Is it amenable to reform? Why do so many Muslims seem drawn to extremism? What do words like *Islamism*, *jihadism*, and *fundamentalism* mean in today's world?

Remarkable for the breadth and depth of its analysis, this dialogue between a famous atheist and a former radical is all the more startling for its decorum. Harris and Nawaz have produced something genuinely new: they engage one of the most polarizing issues of our time—fearlessly and fully—and actually make *pro-gress*.

Islam and the Future of Tolerance has been published with the explicit goal of inspiring a wider public discussion by way of example. In a world riven by misunderstanding and violence, Harris and Nawaz demonstrate how two people with very different views can find common ground.

Annual Conference: June 8-11, 2017

The American Humanist Association, the oldest and largest humanist organization in the United States, has held an annual conference since its founding in 1941 so that humanists, atheists,



and freethinkers can gather together for a weekend of informative lectures, networking, and fun activities.

Solar Eclipse Convention: August 19-21, 2017

SAF works with farmworkers, students, and advocates in the Southeast and nationwide to create a more just agricultural system. Since 1992, SAF has engaged thousands of students, farmworker youth, and community members in the farmworker movement.

SAF changes the lives of middle, high school, and out of school migrant youth through the <u>Levante</u> <u>Leadership Institute</u>.

SAF trains, mentors, and supports NC college students to develop organizing skills and become leaders in the farmworker movement through the <u>Student Organizing School</u>.

SAF mobilizes hundreds of college students through its <u>Into the Fields internship</u> and <u>Sowing</u> <u>Seeds for Change fellowship</u>. SAF interns & fellows provide much-needed skills, energy, and time to farmworker organizations and receive a life-changing, educational experience in return.

SAF reaches out to thousands of community members by raising awareness of injustices in the agricultural industry through its From the Ground Up program. SAF uses actions, presentations, publications and email alerts, to inform and mobilize students and community members around current legislation, consumer boycotts, and other justice efforts initiated by farmworkers. SAF coordinates an annual national week of action, <u>Farmworker Awareness</u> <u>Week</u>, to raise awareness about farmworker issues on campuses and in communities.



Each summer, during the prime of South Carolina's growing season, an estimated 15-30 thousand migrant farmworkers flow through fields from the Upstate to the Lowcountry, often working dawn to dusk to cultivate, harvest and pack crops.

Locally, SAF places interns in the camps and fields of Johns Island. The students' work includes translating for the workers and helping them gain access to health care, education, and legal and other support services.





Herb Silverman Political Atheism: The Last Taboo

In "The Last Taboo: Why America Needs Atheism," published in the New Republic in 1996, Wendy Kaminer wrote, "Atheists generate about as much sympathy as pedophiles. But, while pedophilia may at least be characterized as a disease, atheism is a choice, a willful rejection of beliefs to which vast majorities of people cling." I have one small guibble: Atheism is not a "choice." For me, the only choice is whether to be open about my atheism or pretend to believe in a deity for which there is not a scintilla of evidence.

The situation has improved significantly since Kaminer's piece twenty years ago. Much has been written about atheism, including best-selling books by Richard Dawkins, Christopher Hitchens, and others. A number of popular blogs now promote atheism and secularism. In the Internet age, people hear about many worldviews, not just the one in which they were raised. Every new national survey shows a rapid increase of atheists, aqnostics, and those who claim no religious affiliation.

However, atheists continue to be the group people are <u>least</u> <u>likely</u> to vote for. In 1990, I ran an unsuccessful, successful political campaign for governor of South Carolina as the <u>Candidate Without a Prayer</u>. I was unsuccessful in winning the election, of course, but successful in a state Supreme Court victory that overturned the provision in the state Constitution that prohibited atheists from holding public office.



Herb Silverman is founder and President Emeritus of the <u>Secular Coalition for America</u>, author of <u>Candidate Without a Prayer: An Au-</u> tobiography of a Jewish Atheist in the Bible <u>Belt</u>, and Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Mathematics at the College of Charleston.

A similar provision is in the North Carolina Constitution, and some folks in Asheville tried unsuccessfully in 2009 to remove open <u>atheist Cecil</u> <u>Bothwell</u> from its City Council.

In 2010, Wynne LeGrow was the Democratic candidate for the House of Representatives, running as an open atheist in southern Virginia against Randy Forbes, founder of the Congressional Prayer Caucus. LeGrow received 37.5 percent of the vote, the highest percentage for a Democrat running that year against an incumbent Virginia Republican. He details his experience in his book, <u>Last Leper in the Colony</u>.

The complete history of open

atheists in Congress is very short: former Rep. Pete Stark (D-Calif.). He <u>acknowledged</u> <u>being an atheist</u> after the Secular Coalition for America, of which I'm president, sponsored a contest to find the highest-ranking politician who so identified. Stark left Congress in 2012, reducing the number of open atheists in Congress from one to zero.

This brings me to three politicians I assume are atheists, though it must be noted that they don't so identify.

Barney Frank, an openly gay member of Congress for many years, came out as an atheist on the TV show *Real Time with Bill Maher*, but not until he had left office. Unfortunately, he later had a do-over saying his theological views are complicated by his Jewishness and he <u>doesn't know enough</u> to have a firm view on the subject of atheism. Frank also advised politicians not to be frank about their atheism.

Bernie Sanders is an open socialist in the Senate and a presidential candidate. He identifies as a secular Jew. When asked on *Jimmy Kimmel Live* whether he believes in God, Sanders replied, "What my spirituality is about is that we're all in this together and it's not a good thing to believe that as human beings we can turn our backs on the suffering of other people." I have to wonder what God has to do

with that. When I asked Sanders at a South Carolina town hall meeting if he is an atheist, he didn't answer the question but said he was a Jew.

Jamie Raskin recently won the Democratic Party primary in the Eighth Congressional District of Maryland, virtually assuring him of victory in November. He is best known in the secular community for his response to a Bible-quoting state senator:

Senator, when you took your oath of office, you placed your hand on the Bible and swore to uphold the Constitution. You did not place your hand on the Constitution and swear to uphold the Bible.


Raskin received an endorsement and contribution from the Freethought Equality Fund PAC, a political action group founded by the American Hu-

manist Association (AHA). After being described as an atheist, Raskin said he is 100 percent Jewish and doesn't use the "atheist" label. Raskin, a member of the AHA, said his views are consistent with the AHA definition: "Humanism is a progressive philosophy of life that, without theism and other supernatural beliefs, affirms our ability and responsibility to lead ethical lives of personal fulfillment that aspire to the greater good of humanity." If you are "without theism and other supernatural beliefs," it seems clear to me that you are an atheist, whatever your preferred label.

Barney, Bernie, and Jamie have lots in common. They are secular Jews who don't like to talk about religion or call themselves atheists, and they act as if you need to choose between being a Jew and being an atheist. On the contrary, a recent <u>Harris</u> <u>survey</u> shows that the majority (52 percent) of American Jews do not believe in God.

I admire all three politicians for how they have championed minority rights and separation of religion and government. People are free to use their preferred label or labels, but I'm disappointed when otherwise courageous politicians (and there seem to be precious few) do not have the courage to embrace the A -word, which is perhaps the last political taboo.

Unitarian Universalist Association Renews Ties with Boys Scouts of America

On March 24, 2016 the <u>Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA)</u> and the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) signed a <u>Memorandum of Understanding</u> designed to provide guidance to Unitarian Universalist congregations who wish to charter scouting units. This move towards re-establishing organizational ties is due to the BSA's recent policy changes making scouting more inclusive of gay scouts and gay scout leaders.

However, the BSA has not changed its stance on non-theist scouts and non-theist scout leaders. SHL member **Sharon Fratepietro** wrote the following letter to the Unitarian Universalist Association's magazine, *UU World Magazine* and to the American Humanist Association's magazine, *The Humanist*.

To the Editor:

We were very disappointed to learn that the Unitarian Universalist Association has recently renewed its association with the Boy Scouts of America.

The BSA bans atheist, agnostic and humanist scouts and leaders. That the BSA has made a provision for Unitarian Churches to allow troops of boys and leaders who are not God believers does not compensate for the BSA's general policy of discrimination. If the BSA excluded other major groups like African Americans, or Jews, or Muslims, we hope and expect the UUA would decline to associate with the BSA.

We are atheists and secular humanists. Many years ago we joined our local Unitarian Church as token members in appreciation for the many positive contributions the church makes in our community. Since we believe in putting our money where our mouth is, we have donated to the church each year.

In light of the UUA's decision to associate with the intolerant BSA, we are now disinclined to send more money to our local Unitarian Church, once again putting our money where our mouth is. Over a month ago, we sent a polite and temperate letter mentioning our concern and decision to our local UU minister, with a copy to UUA President Peter Morales. Neither has bothered to reply.

Opting Out is a Form of Freedom

SHL member **Amy Monsky** responded to a letter to the editor criticizing students who don't recite the Pledge of Allegiance. Amy's letter was <u>published in the *Post & Courier* on May 30,</u> <u>2016</u>.

Opting Out is a Form of Freedom

There seems to be a general misunderstanding about what it means when a student — or citizen — opts out of saying the Pledge of Allegiance. These Americans are met with scornful accusations of being unpatriotic.

Regarding the South Carolina law that allows students to opt out of the pledge, a reader lamented in a May 11 letter to the editor, "My, oh my, what is our country coming to?"

Exercising one's constitutional right to freedom of conscience is very much American. What is unAmerican is requiring citizens to pledge allegiance to a country founded on freedom of conscience and "liberty for all."

For those who think opting out of the pledge is somehow disrespectful to the sacrifice of service members, I have this to say:

Exercising the constitutional rights that service members fight to defend is the highest form of honor and appreciation that can be given to those service members.

It is each person's individual right to decide whether to say the pledge. The reasons may be as varied as the citizens themselves, but each person's is likely well-thought out and personally meaningful.

You may not agree with someone's decision not to recite the Pledge of Allegiance, and that's fine.

But people who do not participate in the pledge are no less American than you. Having the ability to decide shows that our country is very much where it needs to be.
