Former news editor of Asheville City Paper, former managing editor of Asheville's Mountain Xpress and founding editor of the Warren Wilson College environmental journal Heartstone, he

served for several years as a member of the national editorial board of the Association of Alternative Newsweeklies and currently serves on the boards of two international educational nonprofit organizations working in Latin America. His weekly radio and print journal, Duck Soup: Essays on the Submerging Culture, remained in syndication for 10 years. He was first elected to Asheville's City Council in 2009 and was re-elected in 2013.



Thomas Paine (1737—1809) was an English– American political activist, philosopher, political theorist, and revolutionary. One of the Founding Fathers of the United States, he authored the two most influential pamphlets at the start of the American Revolution, and he inspired the rebels in 1776 to declare independence from Britain. His ideas reflected Enlightenment–era rhetoric of transnational human rights. He has been called "a corsetmaker by trade, a journalist by profes– sion, and a propagandist by inclination."

The play *To Begin the World Over Again: the Life of Thomas Paine*, starring lan Ruskin and



directed by Haskell Wexler, was filmed on March 3, 2015 in front of a live audience at the Lillian Theatre in Hollywood, California.




The following letter to the editor appeared in the Post & Courier, September 15, 2016

I doubt that many people thought he was, but he felt the need to respond to the rumor. Sanford added that he meant no offense to Buddhism and has "an appreciation for every faith around the world."

Had someone called Sanford an atheist, I wonder if his denial would have included his appreciation for atheists. We are a country of all faiths and none. Atheists do not ask for special rights, but we are a growing minority who deserve no less respect than do people of faith.

Letter: Atheists do believe

A misunderstanding exists regarding atheists. In a letter to the editor on Sept. 15, the writer stated: "Atheists do not ask for special rights, but we are a growing minority who deserve no less respect than do people of faith."

Actually, atheists are people of faith and belief, it just happens that atheists believe and have faith in the self above all. As a priest, the way I define faith comes from II Corinthians 5:7, where Paul states: "We walk by faith, not by sight." So faith for the Christian is: Forsaking all, I trust Jesus.

For the atheist it could be translated this way: Forsaking all, I trust — me. In my mind it takes more faith to believe in the self above all else than it does to believe that Jesus is the caring, forgiving and loving son of God. It requires more faith to consider we all ended up on planet Earth through a scientific maneuver than the divine plan of God.

We all have faith, and it would be a mistake to pretend we don't. It's just a question of what we put our faith in.



Alex Kasman submitted his reply to Rev. Zadig (not yet published in the Post & Courier)

In a recent letter, Rev. Alfred Zadig, Jr. wrote that atheists are also "people of faith" in that they "have faith in the self above all". I write now to correct this mischaracterization of both the word "faith" and of atheists.

According to the first definition listed at <u>Merriam-Webster.com</u>, "faith" is belief in God. By definition, atheists do not have that. The next definition listed is "firm belief in something for which there is no proof".

This second definition is important for two reasons. It is a source of pride for many religious people that their faith does not rely on evidence, since they see it as a test. The letter's suggestion that "faith" means nothing different than "belief" is therefore unfair to them. Moreover, when atheists say our beliefs are not examples of faith, we are just sincerely explaining

that they do depend on evidence. For instance, I do not believe the Biblical account of creation because geological, biological, astronomical and physical evidence all say it didn't happen that way. If the evidence supported it, I would believe it...but even then that would not be an example of "faith."

In addition, I am disturbed by the letter's emphasis on the word "self" because it may leave readers with a misimpression that atheists are isolated or self-

ish. The evidence we consider in determining our beliefs is not limited to our own thoughts, but includes the discoveries and writings of experts in all disciplines around the world. We are part of families, local communities (such as our group, the Secular Humanists of the Lowcountry which recently celebrated its 20th anniversary) and even national organizations (like the American Humanist Association, which is meeting in Charleston in June). And, importantly, we are part of the global community of humanity, doing our part to make the world a better place through charitable acts.

If we are seeking common ground between those who are religious and those who are not, that common desire to help other people seems like a better place to start than Rev. Zadig's misleading claim that we all have "faith".
