About SHL

The Secular Humanists of the Lowcountry was founded in 1994 by a group of local non-theists in Charleston, South Carolina.

Our members are freethinkers of many kinds. We call ourselves agnostics, atheists, skeptics, secular humanists, rationalists and scientific naturalists. We welcome you and all who are interested in participating in our friendly community, either as members or observers.

The purpose of our non-profit, educational organization is to promote the non-theistic, human-centered viewpoint as a valid contribution to public discourse and to strive to maintain the First Amendment guarantee of separation of state and church.

The Black community, while still heavily religious, has also produced some of the most talented and prolific authors, entertainers and activists in history. Included in this are those who have challenged the church and religion, from Gordon Parks and James Baldwin, to Richard Pryor and Martin Lawrence. Our April speaker, Mandisa Thomas, will discuss and share some of the works of these mavericks who dared to take on this subject, and displayed the diversity that has always been present within this community. Be prepared to be entertained and enlightened by this presentation which will show that Blacks who dissented with religion were never an anomaly.

Mandisa Thomas, who previously spoke to SHL in 2012, is the founder and President of Black



Nonbelievers, Inc. She has a number of media appearances to her credit, including CBS Sunday Morning, CNN.com, and JET magazine. She has been a quest on podcasts such as The Humanist Hour and Ask an Atheist, as well as the documentaries Contradiction and My Week in Atheism. Mandisa currently serves on the Boards for American Atheists and the Reason Rally Coalition, and previously for Foundation Beyond Belief and the Secular Coalition for America.

As the president of Black Nonbelievers, Inc., Mandisa works to encourage more Blacks to come out and stand strong with their nonbelief in the face of such strong religious overtones. "The more we make our presence known, the better our chances of working together to turn around some of the disparities we face. We are not alone.'

No "back stock" is necessary because the items are printed only when someone orders one. There are lots of different companies providing similar services for similar prices, and after comparing them we selected "Zazzle".




We've been selling t-shirts, mugs, stickers, and bags emblazoned with the SHL logo and sayings at our online store for a few months now. In many ways it has been working well: the items are popular and are selling well. But, it is true that the prices can be a bit intimidating. Here are a few tips to help you get the best items and the best prices:

 Wait until there's a sale. Zazzle always seems to have a sale on something, and if you wait a month or two the item you want is sure to go on sale for 40% off or more.

- You can also buy some of these items at our meetings. Since we bought them on sale, we can sell them to you at a discount, and you don't have to wait for delivery!
- Be careful when making changes to the products. Although it offers you the option of changing things like the color or cut of the shirt, it is up to you to check to make sure that it still looks right after that change. Nothing in the program makes sure that the colors match or that the logo will fit on the other shirt shape. Take a look at the displayed sample with any modifications you choose to make sure it still looks good before buying.

This month we will meet at Manny's in West Ashley. Everyone is welcome—we hope to see you there!






SHL Book Club



Charity of the Quarter Turning Leaf Project



Turning Leaf Project is a rehabilitation and reentry nonprofit organization serving adult men who are assessed at a medium to high risk of re-incarceration. We are both an education and employment program. Our first focus is on helping our students increase their thinking, decision and problem-solving skills. Our second priority is job placement. We choose to work with men who have repeat criminal convictions; men who have not changed their behavior as a response to incarceration and who need assistance to change their life direction.

Turning Leaf is different from other reentry efforts in South Carolina, and across the country, for various reasons. We are based on what evidence shows us works to reduce reoffending. We only work with individuals who are at a medium to high risk of re-arrest. We focus on helping our students change their thinking, attitudes, belief and peers the risk factors most closely associated with criminal behavior. We spend very little time and resources helping our students with food, transportation, clothing and housing. These needs are not shown to be drivers of continual criminal behavior. We offer a reentry program

for men returning from prison and jail and an alternative sentencing program for federal detainees. Our center based program is comprehensive. The men participate in 15 hours of rehabilitation classes at the Turning Leaf center each week. Making progress in classes earns them a job placement with the City of Charleston, North Charleston or Charleston County. The men are paid an educational stipend of up to \$150 a week for their time in classes prior to being placed in transitional work.

The issue of reentry is especially relevant for South Carolina and the Charleston area. Charleston County manages the largest jail in the state (daily population of 1,200). More than 31,000 inmates processed through the Charleston County Detention Center in 2011. Approximately 600 individuals return to Charleston County from state prisons alone every year. The growth in South Carolina's prison population mirrors the national trend. Research and data shows that the increase in national prison population was driven not by an increase in crime, but by state decisions to put more low-risk, nonviolent offenders behind bars, to increase prison terms for violent

and non-violent offenders, and to neglect community corrections and reentry programs. As a result, a significant number of parole and probation violators return to prison. South Carolina's state incarcerated population has nearly tripled in the last 25 years, now over 22,000 state inmates, a number that does not include those in SC jails or federal prisons. This growth has come at a significant financial cost to taxpayers. Since 1983, state spending on prisons increased by more than 500 percent to \$394 million. Few organizations exist in Charleston to help the formerly incarcerated population. Those that do operate in silos, providing fragmented and uncoordinated services in separate locations. Most importantly, local rehabilitation efforts typically don't focus on the risk factors that research shows us most correlate to reoffending.

Most recent national data reports that 67% of everyone leaving prison will return in three years. Although we are a new organization with limited data, our initial results are promising. Our three year goal is a reincarceration rate of less than 30% for program graduates.


Herb Silverman Freedom or Theocratic Caucus?

Rep. Ted Poe (R-TX) quit the Freedom Caucus in anger because the overwhelming majority of its members objected to the recently proposed American Health Care Act. In an attempt to denigrate the Freedom Caucus, Poe added, "I got the opinion that there's some members of the Freedom Caucus, they would vote no against the Ten Commandments if they came up for a vote." I should hope they would all vote "No." If the Freedom Caucus stands for freedom, they would be required to vote against promoting the Ten Commandments as the law of the land.

The first commandment, "Thou shalt have no other gods," conflicts with the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution that guarantees freedom of religion—the right to worship one, several, or no gods. In fact, strict adherence to this commandment might be problematic for a Christian like Poe because the one "true" god is Yahweh, not Jesus. The next two commandments (no graven images, not taking God's name in vain) describe how to worship and pay homage to a jealous and vindictive God who punishes several generations of children because their fathers did not worship in the correct way. Our secular laws don't hold children responsible for misdeeds or "sins" of their parents.

The fourth commandment, keeping the Sabbath day holy (Saturday, not Sunday), describes a God who created the world in six days and rested on the seventh. In other words, this commandment would require the teaching of creationism in public schools.

The tenth commandment, "Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor's

house, wife, slaves, ox, donkey, or any other property," condones slavery and treating women as property. Furthermore, support for this commandment would mean that the Freedom Caucus opposes an important component of American capitalism and advertising, which rely heavily on coveting our neighbor's possessions.

Americans have the freedom to follow or ignore religious commandments. Would Rep. Poe really want to make the Ten Commandments the law of the land, which would turn our freedomloving, pluralistic, and democratic society into a theocracy? Perhaps Poe only wants members of Congress to personally endorse religious commandments, rather than impose them on all Americans. If so, such a religious test for public office would still be wrong and unconstitutional.

However, Poe's motives might be even more sinister. In 2011, AlterNet reported that Poe wanted to remove the right of deceased soldiers' families to choose which prayers, if any, were to be read at

a soldier's funeral. Incredibly, if the story is true, he and two other politicians attempted to impose Christian ceremonies on the military funerals of everybody who has served in the military, regardless of whether the deceased was Christian.

Requiring non-Christians to have Christian funerals would rival the antics of Westboro Baptist Church, best known for its God Hates Fags slogan and for picketing funerals of those who don't meet their strict Christian standards. As long as members of Westboro Baptist Church don't prevent others from partaking in "sinful" ceremonies, they are exercising their constitutionally guaranteed right to free speech, however odious the speech. (Note: This is an endorsement of freedom, not Westboro Baptist Church.)

I hope members of the Freedom Caucus and all political leaders can endorse the freedom of Americans to worship or not worship as they please, without government interference. Individuals may place the Ten Commandments or passages from the Quran on their private property or houses of worship, but our secular government may not endorse one religion over another or religion over nonreligion. One of the best ways to support freedom for all Americans is to promote the separation of religion and government. Were members of the Freedom Caucus to endorse the Ten Commandments as the law of the land, they should then change their name to the Theocratic Caucus.

Membership

Are you a dues-paying member of SHL? While our meetings and events are open to everyone, membership dues are used to bring in national speakers at our monthly meetings, pay the Gage Hall rental fee, provide snacks at the monthly meeting, provide materials given away at outreach events such as the Flowertown Festival, and more. In addition, only dues-paying

members are eligible to apply for stipends for attending secular conferences or summer camp. Most importantly, members vote for the SHL board members at the annual May potluck.

Annual memberships are:

- Lifetime membership is \$500.00

Stipends

SHL offers five stipends annually to dues-paying members to help offset costs associated with attending an atheist/freethought conference or convention, or to attend a freethought summer camp. Some examples of eligible events are the Freedom From Religion Foundation convention, Atheist Alliance convention, Camp Quest, and Camp Inquiry, among others.

Stipends are available to duespaying members. A member may not receive a stipend two consecutive years, however different members of a family membership are eligible even if another family member received a stipend the previous year.

For out-of-town conventions and camps, stipends cover up to \$200 of registration, travel, and lodging costs. Food and

drink expenses are not eligible for stipends. **Special for 2017:** SHL is offering 20 additional \$50 stipends to be used for either the American Humanist Association conference or the American Atheist convention being held in Charleston.

A stipend request must be pre-approved before attending your event. To see whether your event qualifies or to inquire about stipend availability and to apply, or if you have questions about the stipend program, contact <u>treasurer</u> @lowcountryhumanists.org.

Stipend recipients must write a short essay about their event experience and submit it along with receipts to treasurer@lowcountryhumanists.org within 30 days of the completion of the event. The essay will be published in an issue of *The Separationist*. Parents may assist young children who attended camp with their essays but the essay should reflect the child's own words as much as possible.
