


SHL Book Club

In May we are reading *The Myth of the Strong Leader: Political Leadership in the Modern Age* by Archie Brown (2014, 482p). In this magisterial and wideranging survey of political leadership over the past hundred years, renowned Oxford professor Archie Brown challenges the widespread belief that strong leaders – meaning those who dominate their colleagues and the policy-



making process - are the most successful and admirable.

Bill Gates' Favorite Books of 2016 states that this book is "an important and unusual read ... Brown does a wonderful job of showing how the same qualities that can be seem as so appealing in strong leaders can lead, in mild cases, to bad decisions and in the most extreme cases to death and suffering on a massive scale. After reading this book you come away with a deeper understanding of leadership in general."

It is not a strict rule that you have read the book by the time of the club meeting. We find that those who have not read the material before hand can contribute interesting insights to the topic and then are compelled to do further reading. Always a good thing. We have a list of books we are considering for future book club meetings. At our monthly meetings we then vote on which books from this list are to be read when. And we



Humanist Disaster Recovery in Louisiana

Saturday, May 27—Wednesday, June 7,2017 Louisiana

Humanist Disaster Relief will deploy a team to assist in the rebuilding efforts in Louisiana in the aftermath of storms and flooding. The team will work in Louisiana between May 27th, 2017 and June 7th, 2017.



The mission of Humanist Disaster Recovery Teams (HDR Teams) is to provide recovering communities with trained humanist volunteers. HDR Teams is the first national humanist disaster recovery volunteer program. The 2016 South Carolina Humanist Disaster Recovery Team was the first deployment of the HDR Teams program: they worked in Columbia South Carolina rebuilding homes with our partner, St. Bernard Project, after flooding caused by Hurricane Joaquin in late 2015. The team trained, demolished the interior of a home, performed mold remediation, hung drywall, mudded, sanded, and primed homes in the area. Several SHL members volunteered for the Columbia HDR team.



Member Stipends

SHL offers five stipends annually to dues-paying members to help offset costs associated with attending an atheist/freethought conference or convention, or to attend a freethought summer camp. Some examples of eligible events are the Freedom From Religion Foundation convention, Atheist Alliance convention, Camp Quest, and Camp Inquiry, among others.



For out-of-town conventions and camps, stipends cover up to \$200 of registration, travel, and lodging costs. Food and

drink expenses are not eligible for stipends. **Special for 2017:** SHL is offering 20 additional \$50 stipends to be used for either the American Humanist Association conference or the American Atheist convention being held in Charleston.

A stipend request must be pre-approved before attending your event. To see whether your event qualifies or to inquire about stipend availability and to apply, or if you have questions about the stipend program, contact treasurer @lowcountryhumanists.org.

Stipend recipients must write a short essay about their event experience and submit it along with receipts to treasurer@lowcountryhumanists.org within 30 days of the completion of the event. The essay will be published in an issue of *The Separationist*. Parents may assist young children who attended camp with their essays but the essay should reflect the child's own words as much as possible.

Turning Leaf Project



Turning Leaf Project is a rehabilitation and reentry nonprofit organization serving adult men who are assessed at a medium to high risk of re-incarceration. We are both an education and employment program. Our first focus is on helping our students increase their thinking, decision and problem-solving skills. Our second priority is job placement. We choose to work with men who have repeat criminal convictions; men who have not changed their behavior as a response to incarceration and who need assistance to change their life direction.

Turning Leaf is different from other reentry efforts in South Carolina, and across the country, for various reasons. We are based on what evidence shows us works to reduce reoffending. We only work with individuals who are at a medium to high risk of re-arrest. We focus on helping our students change their thinking, attitudes, belief and peers - the risk factors most closely associated with criminal behavior. We spend very little time and resources helping our students with food, transportation, clothing and housing. These needs are not shown to be drivers of continual criminal behavior. We offer a reentry program

for men returning from prison and jail and an alternative sentencing program for federal detainees. Our center based program is comprehensive. The men participate in 15 hours of rehabilitation classes at the Turning Leaf center each week. Making progress in classes earns them a job placement with the City of Charleston, North Charleston or Charleston County. The men are paid an educational stipend of up to \$150 a week for their time in classes prior to being placed in transitional work.

The issue of reentry is especially relevant for South Carolina and the Charleston area. Charleston County manages the largest jail in the state (daily population of 1,200). More than 31,000 inmates processed through the Charleston County Detention Center in 2011. Approximately 600 individuals return to Charleston County from state prisons alone every year. The growth in South Carolina's prison population mirrors the national trend. Research and data shows that the increase in national prison population was driven not by an increase in crime, but by state decisions to put more low-risk, nonviolent offenders behind bars, to increase prison terms for violent

and non-violent offenders, and to neglect community corrections and reentry programs. As a result, a significant number of parole and probation violators return to prison. South Carolina's state incarcerated population has nearly tripled in the last 25 years, now over 22,000 state inmates, a number that does not include those in SC jails or federal prisons. This growth has come at a significant financial cost to taxpayers. Since 1983, state spending on prisons increased by more than 500 percent to \$394 million. Few organizations exist in Charleston to help the formerly incarcerated population. Those that do operate in silos, providing fragmented and uncoordinated services in separate locations. Most importantly, local rehabilitation efforts typically don't focus on the risk factors that research shows us most correlate to reoffending.

Most recent national data reports that 67% of everyone leaving prison will return in three years. Although we are a new organization with limited data, our initial results are promising. Our three year goal is a reincarceration rate of less than 30% for program graduates.

Atheist Stranger in a Strange Religious Land

Herb Silverman was born on June 14, 1942 — Flag Day, which perhaps accounts for his patriotism. He came of age in the turbulent 1960s, attending first Temple University in Philadelphia, then Syracuse University in the middle of New York State, earning degrees in mathematics. In 1976, he moved to the Lowcountry to teach at the College of Charleston. Silverman published more than 100 research papers in math journals, as well as a couple of books on complex variables. He retired as Distinguished Professor Emeritus in 2009 and turned more of his attention to writing books and essays, not about math or academia but about atheism and America's culture wars. Looking back over his career, he does not relinquish his optimism. "It was nearly all good, and when it wasn't good it was interesting," he said.

Q: You are a well-known advocate of the First Amendment and a vocal atheist. What prompted you to "go public" with your arguments?

A: My political activism was triggered by the Vietnam War and civil rights movement, not by atheism. As a math professor at liberal Clark University in Worcester, Massachusetts, I assumed that

atheism was the default of my academic colleagues. Despite many marches and protests (including a brief incarceration), I failed to end the war.

However, I did make one civil rights contribution. After my Ph.D. student, Evelyn, passed her qualifying exams, I took her to a local bar to celebrate. The bartender told me that the bar was for men only, and Evelyn would have to leave. The following day, I returned with another woman, a black colleague. The bartender was more uncomfortable being viewed a racist than a sexist, so he let us stay. The next day I brought Evelyn back, and they served us. And from then on, that bar admitted women.

Q: In 1990, you ran for governor as a way to challenge a

provision in the state's constitution that forbid nonbelievers from holding public office. Then you tried to become a notary public for the same reason. In 1997, the S.C. Supreme Court ruled in your favor that requiring an oath to God was unconstitutional. Were you satisfied with the decision?

A: I'm certainly satisfied with the unanimous decision of the S.C. Supreme Court that the state constitution was in violation of Article VI of the U.S. Constitution, which prohibits religious tests for public office. The state wasted close to \$100,000 over seven years trying to prevent me from becoming a notary public. Atheists can now legally hold public office in South Carolina, but the unfinished business is to actually elect open atheists.

We know through the Secular Coalition for America (of which I'm president) that there are many closeted atheists in Congress, and we are trying to encourage them to come out. Our goal is to change stereotypes and increase the visibility of and respect for atheists. I hope we reach a point in this secular country where candidates are judged by the content of their character and their political positions, not by their professed religious beliefs.

Q: You taught mathematics at the College of Charleston for many years. Do you think empiricism and religious faith are incompatible, or is there perhaps a way to reconcile the two?

A: I value empirical evidence to learn about the natural world. I've seen students pray before my math tests, but studying is more effective. Before making a decision, I like to have as much knowledge as possible. However, I sometimes take a "leap of faith," as when I fell in love and married Sharon, a good choice and happy outcome.

I view religious faith as mostly evidence-free, though such faith can make people happy. I've had interesting discussions and debates with people who try to explain why their religious faith is reasonable, but I've not yet heard a convincing argument. On the other hand, there is not much to discuss if someone tells me he is "saved" because Jesus came into his heart. I prefer focusing on this life, rather than a faith belief in an imagined afterlife.

Q: You have written at length about your adventures and misadventures in your memoir "Candidate Without a Prayer," and in numerous columns for the Huffington Post and other publications, now collected in a new book called "An Atheist Stranger in a

Strange Religious Land." What kind of reactions have you received from readers?

A: Many are surprised that atheists can have a sense of humor. Also, early on, I heard from people who thought they were the only atheists in South Carolina. I took names and a number of them helped start the Secular Humanists of the Lowcountry, now a thriving organization. ... Attitudes change when friends, neighbors, or even family members discover that you are an atheist and a nice person who does good without god belief.

I wasn't out to my own family until 1990, when I got a call from a distressed woman in Philadelphia — my mother! The Associated Press picked up a story about me, and I had to admit that The Philadelphia Inquirer was not the best way to learn that her only child was a gubernatorial candidate — and an atheist. I knew my mother would be upset because she always wanted me to appear "respectable."

Q: What is the status today of atheism and its treatment by nonatheists?

A: Among religious demographics counted today, there's a category called "nones," meaning people who are religiously unaffiliated, and it's one of the fastest-growing segments. They are not all atheists or agnostics,

but a significant percentage are — especially among young adults. As our culture becomes more diverse, there is more openness toward other points of view, and we are slowly gaining a place at the advocacy table along with religious groups.

The Internet has probably been the single most important factor in empowering young people with inquiring minds to learn about the many choices for religious belief or nonbelief. ... There is room for all beliefs and none in this wonderful country. Regardless of theological beliefs, I hope we can work together on social justice issues and make America even greater, while placing more value on deeds than on creeds.
